## Executive Overview



- The Oak Park Health Department has been an Illinois certified local health department since 1948. It is one of only five municipal certified health departments in the state of Illinois.
- Grants and Village funds allow the Health Department to carry out a variety of public health programs:
  - Food Protection
  - Communicable Disease Prevention and Surveillance
  - HIV/AIDs Surveillance
  - Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention
  - Illinois Tobacco Free Communities
  - West Nile Virus / Mosquito Prevention
  - Body Art (Tattoo) Inspections
  - Public Health Emergency Preparedness and Response Activities
  - Farmers Market
  - Exterior Rat Control

# Certified Health Department




 "Performance of the core public health functions is the unique feature that distinguishes a certified local health department from any other public health provider in a local area.

### Why have a certified health department?

- Certification is an eligibility requirement for Local Health Protection Grants awarded by Illinois
- Ensures local specifics are taken into consideration
- Direct access to medical interventions i.e. COVID-19 vaccines

# Fiscal Year 2026 Priorities



- Submit the IPLAN to the Illinois Department of Public Health to maintain status as a Certified Local Health Department
- Focus on Health Equity and the Social Determinants of Health
- Collaborate with community partners to create an integrated, equitable, and accessible healthcare referral network that directs underserved communities to the health care services they need
- Create an interactive dashboard showing various health metrics and demographics within Oak Park
- Collaborate with community partners to promote a vaccine educational campaign
- Reestablish regular meetings with community partners on emergency preparedness and response planning
