# A. Program Description

This funding opportunity is for the Local Health Protection Grant (LHPG) program, for State FY 2017 (7/1/2016 6/30/2017).

The LHPG program is authorized by a direct appropriation and by the following statutes: Division 5-25 of the Counties Code (55 ILCS 5), The Public Health District Act (70 ILCS 905), the Illinois Municipal Code (65 ILCS 5), and Section 2310-15 of the Civil Administrative Code of Illinois (20 ILCS 2310/2310-15). The LHPG program is governed by the Local Health Protection Grant Code (77 III. Adm. Code 615).

The purpose of the LHPG program is to support a statewide system of local health departments to assure the protection of the public through the provision of various health protection programs. The Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) administers the LHPG program, which provides funding to all certified local health departments in Illinois. This funding ensures that basic levels of protection for Illinois residents are maintained at the community level for infectious diseases, food protection, safety of the potable water supply, and private sewage disposal. IDPH has funded the LHPG program for over 20 years.

Each certified local health department must implement the following health protection programs: a comprehensive program to control infectious diseases; a comprehensive food protection program; a program to assure provision of safe, potable supplies of water for drinking, culinary, and sanitary purposes, with the focus on non-community, semi-private, and private water supplies; and a program to prevent the transmission of disease organisms, environmental contamination, and nuisances resulting from improper handling, storage, transportation, and disposal of sewage from private sewage disposal systems. Each certified local health department must administer these health protection programs in accordance with the Local Health Protection Grant Code.

The Local Health Protection Grant (LHPG) program is funded from State General Revenue Funds (GRF).

The LHPG funding for FY 2017 is estimated to be the same as the FY 2016 funding. Total funding for FY 2017 is \$17,098,500. Individual awards to certified local health departments are also estimated to be level with the FY 2016 funding amounts; those individual awards range from \$63,201 to \$2,540,278.

The LHPG program is a formula-based grant program. The formula for funding is based on the total population and the number of persons with incomes below 200 percent of the federal poverty level.

LHPG funds may be used by certified local health departments for any health protection program or service including, but not limited to, Infectious Diseases, Food Protection, Potable Water Supply, and Private Sewage Disposal. The grant funds are intended to supplement other Federal, State, and local funds available to support local health protection programs, including the four programs that must be assured. Provided the four programs are assured, the local health departments may use the LHPG funds for any health protection program, activity or service, or for shared management or administrative support costs (which must be detailed by budget line item).

Eligible Applicants
Only certified local health departments in Illinois are eligible to apply for a grant under the LHPG program.
Section 615.200 of the Local Health Protection Grant Code (77 III. Adm. Code 615) states that a local health department is eligible to receive LHPG funds if it is certified pursuant to Section 600.210 of the Certified Local Health Department Code (77 III. Adm. Code 600) and if it assures that the four health protection programs of Infectious Diseases, Food Protection, Potable Water Supply, and Private Sewage Disposal are provided in accordance with the Local Health Protection Grant Code. Assumption of direct service by another unit of local government shall fulfill this assurance for that portion of the local health department's jurisdiction.
Cost Sharing or Matching
No cost sharing or matching is required for the LHPG program. Applicants may, however, voluntarily list cash or in-kind amounts in the grant budget.
Indirect Cost Rate
Indirect costs are not allowed for the LHPG program. Section 615.210 of the Local Health Protection Grant Code (77 III. Adm. Code 615) states that the LHPG funds are intended to supplement other Federal, State, and local funds available to support local health protection programs. The LHPG funds are therefore not intended to cover all costs associated with provision of health protection programs.

# 2. Content and Form of Application Submission

All applications must be submitted through EGrAMS (link above). All sections of the application must be completed, and the application must be validated, certified, and submitted through EGrAMS.

For the Scope of Work, under Project Goals, each applicant must list at least one objective for each of the four LHPG program areas (Infectious Diseases, Food Protection, Potable Water, and Private Sewage Disposal). If any of the four LHPG program areas does not apply to the applicant, enter "N/A" and include a brief description to explain why that program area does not apply.

For the Work Plan, each objective listed under Project Goals must have at least one activity. For each activity, list the responsible staff, the date or date range for the activity, and the expected outcome (if applicable).

If the budget includes any cash or in-kind amounts, the source of those funds must be identified.

# 3. Dun and Bradstreet Universal Numbering System (DUNS) Number and System for Award Management (SAM)

Final approval of the grant applications in EGrAMS cannot be completed until all internal IDPH approvals have been obtained. Grant agreements under the LHPG will be effective July 1, 2016, regardless of the timing of the final EGrAMS approval.
