SCOPE OF SERVICES AND PROGRAM GOALS AND MEASURES

The Village agrees to give Grantee a stand by funding commitment not to exceed \$268,103 for the actual expenses to create an Interim Housing at 324 N. Austin owned by the Oak Park Housing Authority. Grantee agrees to provide the Village with the exact number of people assisted including the number of adults and minor children and will certify that but for the funding provided by the Village of Oak Park that the household would be homeless or at risk of homelessness. Households must reside, formerly reside due to their status as homeless, work or go to school in the Village of Oak Park. Grantee agrees to provide the Village of Oak Park with the annual income of each household assisted.

Households shall have incomes less than 50% of the Area Median Income. The maximum length of assistance for any household shall be no longer than 24 months. A homeless individual is defined in section 330(h)(4)(A) as "an individual who lacks housing (without regard to whether the individual is a member of a family), including an individual whose primary residence during the night is a supervised public or private facility (e.g., shelters) that provides temporary living accommodations, and an individual who is a resident in transitional housing." A homeless person is an individual without permanent housing who may live on the streets; stay in a shelter, mission, single room occupancy facilities, abandoned building or vehicle; or in any other unstable or non-permanent situation. [Section 330 of the Public Health Service Act (42 U.S.C., 254b)]

An individual may be considered to be homeless if that person is "doubled up," a term that refers to a situation where individuals are unable to maintain their housing situation and are forced to stay with a series of friends and/or extended family members. In addition, previously homeless individuals who are to be released from a prison or a hospital may be considered homeless if they do not have a stable housing situation to which they can return. Recognition of the instability of an individual's living arrangements is critical to the definition of homelessness.
